A PIONEERING PUB

On 22 July people from 12 groups campaigning to buy their local pubs came on a Study Visit to The Dog Inn. This visit was part of a two day programme visiting 3 community owned pubs across north England. The group was given a tour and history of The Dog Inn, a buffet lunch and a chance to network at the bar or coffee shop. A seminar on raising finance for community owned pubs was delivered by our chair, Dave Hollings.

Everyone involved in this event did The Dog Inn proud. Emma and her team delivered the best of Belthorn hospitality. Thanks especially to our volunteers, Diane, Jean, Florence and Kath for their efforts.

Visit organiser Charlotte Foster said: "May I say just how much we enjoyed the visit on Friday. It really was fantastic and thoroughly enjoyed by each and everyone of us!"

"To receive such a warm welcome and such kind hospitality - it was all quite overwhelming and I have to say I felt that our time at The Dog Inn was the highlight of our tour and a great way to finish off the pioneering pub event."

The Study Visit was part of the More than a Pub Project funded by the Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG) and Power to Change." On Saturday 6th August, the village committee hosted an Olympic-themed fun day at the Dog Inn, which included BBQ, Dog Show, pony rides and much, much more.

A year ago, before we had bought the pub, being able to host this sort of Community event was just a dream: but it is now a dream that has come true, and a dream that we were able to share with other groups hoping to run their own community pubs in the "More than a Pub" project.

Annual General Meeting

The Dog Inn (Belthorn) Ltd held its first Annual General Meeting on Wed 25th May 2016. This was well attended, with nearly 30 shareholders present.

Prior to the AGM, Andy Bain had notified the Board of his intention to step down, and we would like to thank him for all his hard work during the first year of the project, especially for all his work on the procurement side of the business.

We had two new nominations for Board members (Craig Steele and Dave Taylor), and as our rules allow us to have up to 12 Board members, we were delighted to be able to accept both onto the Board.

At a Board meeting following the AGM, the roles and responsibilities of the new Board were decided, and these are as follows:

Chair: Dave Hollings Vice Chair: Kevin Kraushaar Secretary: Kathryn Sharpe Treasurer: Dave Taylor

Marketing, Refurb and HR teams were also set up.

During the AGM we asked members present for their feedback on things that the Board had done well so far, and things that we could have done better.

We also asked for suggestions for the future. We had a lot of positive feedback, with many people commenting on the friendly staff, the warm and welcoming atmosphere, the cosy coffee shop and the fantastic work done by the refurb team.

However, a few negative issues were raised, and we would now like to take this opportunity to

You said: Our range of real ales is too small. Our response: We are limited on the number of real ales we can sell at one time by consumption, as the real ales have a very short shelf life once opened: if we have too many casks open at once, the beer will go off resulting in wastage. However, there has been a suggestion, now that business is picking up, that we do offer a "guest ale": this will probably happen in the next few weeks

and will be on a trial basis.

You said: The coffee shop is not open long enough. Our response: We are limited on coffee shop opening hours by the availability of volunteers. However, to help address this situation, the bar is now open from 12 noon daily, and the staff have been trained on the use of the coffee machine, etc, so that if we are short of volunteers, there is still the capacity to open the coffee shop. Opening hours of the coffee shop and the bar will continue to be reviewed.

You said: The restaurant is taking too long. Our response: The refurbishment team have had to concentrate their efforts on the upstairs room, as we already have bookings for this room and the grant for this expires soon. Once this is completed, work on the restaurant & kitchens can get under way.

You said: The shop needs to be opened. Our response: We had a significant delay on the shop due to the requirement for "change of use" planning consent. However, this has now been granted, and we are looking for help with setting up and organising the shop.

You said: Food should be served from the coffee shop preferably home-made. Our response: Environmental Health Officers have told us that we cannot sell any food that is not individually packaged until we have a dedicated hand-wash basin in the coffee shop. Due to plumbing issues this has taken a while to sort out, but is now done. We will shortly be able to sell sandwiches, toasties, etc. However, we are still not permitted to sell home-made food (& cakes) if it has been made on a premises not licensed by Environmental Health. Once we get the upstairs kitchen refurbished, we may have an option to make food/bake up there to sell in the coffee shop.

You said: The community gardens are taking too long. Our response: We are using volunteers to help us wherever possible, and as such we work to their time-scales. We are very grateful to Terry Holden, and to Chris Nuttall for doing some ground works on the back field so that we can get moving with this area of the project.
